2023 Year in Review – What has been occupying our time at AMA (NSW)?

<u>Payroll Tax</u>

One of the many issues AMA (NSW) tackled in 2023 was the issue of payroll tax, a matter on which the AMA has been campaigning since 2018. After the success of the <u>"Your Quality Care Taxed"</u> campaign, another state-wide <u>campaign</u> was launched in February this year encouraging patients to help GPs fight what was described as "a potentially devastating tax". The pressure <u>continued</u> in the lead up to the state election with repeated warnings of the dangers of payroll tax both to those in the city and the <u>regions</u> and renewed calls for an exemption. After a Court of Appeals decision in the case of Thomas and Naaz Pty Ltd AMA (NSW) <u>warned</u> that general practices were put at greater risk of being liable for payroll tax.

In early August NSW State Revenue published rulings confirming for the first time that many independent GPs working in medical centres would be subject to payroll tax. AMA (NSW)'s response was reported <u>widely</u>.

AMA (NSW) joined other associations to successfully secure a yearlong amnesty to allow further consultation. A very successful meeting was held with the finance minister with whom further talks are expected in 2024.

Special Commission of Inquiry into Healthcare Funding (SCOI)

The Minns government formally announced the <u>SCOI</u> in September, with sweeping terms of reference, sparking a <u>swift response</u> from <u>AMA (NSW)</u>. After Treasurer Daniel Mookhey misspoke, conflating the incomes of locums and VMOs, AMA (NSW) went on a <u>media offensive</u>, in an attempt to clarify the situation in a <u>series</u> of <u>articles</u>. Concerned for the future employment conditions of VMOs, the terms and conditions of VMO arrangements were the subject of AMA (NSW)'s first submission to the SCOI which you can read <u>here</u>. As the inquiry continues AMA (NSW) will have the opportunity to give evidence on.

- The rights of consultants to accept private patients under their care in public hospitals.
- The need for collaboration between Colleges & LHDs to ensure the provision of high-quality training.

- Whether greater reliance on primary care may reduce pressure on resources and staff in public hospitals and
- Engagement & remuneration of locums.

Guidelines for the Provision of Relevant Services (Health and Related Services) issued by SIRA

On December 8, 2023, SIRA issued new guidelines as part of their regulatory framework for those providing Health and Related Services to injured workers as a part of the Workers Compensation Scheme, and injured persons under the CTP Schemes. The Guidelines relate to <u>legislation</u> which gives SIRA broad powers to regulate doctors and other health providers.

AMA (NSW) has <u>expressed significant concern</u> to SIRA over the past two years and has secured some changes. However, we continue to have concerns about what this will mean for doctors providing services to injured persons.

AMA (NSW) will be holding a webinar in early 2024 to brief members on the legislation and the guidelines and possible implications for doctors and patients.
